ANNUAL GIFTS

Each year, Covenant HealthCare Foundation provides an opportunity for its employees, physicians and area community members to support the hospital through the Annual Fund. Traditionally, this effort kicks off in late fall. Monies raised through annual gifts support programs, equipment purchases and capital projects. The impact these monies have had and continue to have on the operation of the hospital is vital. Over the past ten years, more than \$2 million dollars have been raised through Annual Fund gifts. These monies are important to keep Covenant HealthCare services on top of technology. As Covenant maintains and expands the quality of health care services, Annual Fund gifts continue to go a long way in helping to provide extraordinary care for every generation that continues to be Covenant's pledge and promise. When you have the opportunity to make your Covenant Annual Fund gift, know you are making an impact to insure the best medical care is available today and tomorrow right here in your own community. 2 GIFTING FROM ORGANIZATIONS

Members of the Hale Fraternal Order of Eagles Auxiliary have supported Covenant over the past five years by raising some \$19,000 to benefit the Covenant Breast Health Center. The money has specifically been used to support the CARE Fund, which provides free screening mammography and any necessary follow-up care for uninsured or underinsured individuals. Members of the Auxiliary have raised funds by sponsoring pizza nights, bake sales, and quilt raffles. Since 2010, the CARE Fund has provided free mammograms to over 450 individuals who would not have been able to pay for the service otherwise. Covenant HealthCare Foundation salutes the Hale Eagles! What a great impact this group has made on a very important Covenant program.

3 PLANNED GIVING TO LEAVE A LEGACY

Almost a year and a half ago, Covenant received a \$1 million gift from the estate of Carl H. Werth Jr. and Sandra Werth in support of cancer care at Covenant. With thousands of people a year receiving cancer care at our Mackinaw location, that gift is going to have an impact on people for years to come. Have you ever thought about leaving a legacy? A planned gift is a great way to ensure excellent health care will be available for future generations in our own community and surrounding region. A simple bequest from ones will or trust is an easy way to provide a posthumous gift. Specifying a percentage of one's estate or a specific dollar amount is the most common way estate gifts are structured. The donor simply directs the amount gifted to Covenant HealthCare upon their passing, and either gift it unrestricted or specify an area of interest. You may not be able to make a \$1M gift via your estate, but think if 100 people in the Great Lakes Bay Region each allocated \$10,000 in their estate plan designated for Covenant. Another gift totaling \$1M dollars could be realized. A bequest is only one potential way to structure a planned gift. In addition, the birth center, pediatrics, pediatric emergency care, and the Harrison operating rooms all benefitted from your gifts. The following is an example of the impact one person can have in assisting Covenant with our mission. A patient at Cartwright Center was appreciative for the care she was receiving. She learned from the staff that many patients who would benefit from receiving end-of-life care at Cartwright Center did not have the financial ability to pay for the care; most insurances do not pay for care at Cartwright. As a result, families were overwhelmed with trying to find appropriate services for their loved one. The patient and her family established the Sandra Kahn Cartwright Hospice Residence fund. For patients with no financial ability to cover the cost of care at Cartwright Center, this fund will allow those patients to receive

compassionate, quality end-of-life care in the comfortable, peaceful setting of Cartwright Center. Although Sandra Kahn's family will probably never meet the patients who will benefit from this generosity, the family members of those patients will forever be grateful to the Kahn family. Imagine how many more patients can benefit if others also contribute to this fund.

Whether you choose to contribute to the Sandra Kahn Cartwright Residence fund, another specific fund such as the Cancer Care Center, or make an undesignated contribution, your gift is deeply appreciated and will have an impact.

24/7 access to board-certified physicians from your smartphone, tablet or laptop.

What if the next time you felt under the weather, you didn't have to drag yourself to the doctor's office? What if you could turn your family room into a waiting room? Wear your jammies instead of getting dressed?

Covenant VirtualCare uses technology to enable virtual medical consultations via computer, tablet or smart phone. Covenant HealthCare is proud to be the first and only hospital in the Great Lakes Bay Region to offer a telehealth application like this.

"It's the right time to embrace this powerful new tool, allowing us to increase access to care for our patients," said Executive Vice President Physician Enterprise/CEO Covenant Medical Group, Dr. John Kosanovich. "Our new virtual care service was designed with the patient in mind because it provides a new convenience and flexibility in choosing how they receive their healthcare."

It's easy. Patients can download the Covenant VirtualCare app and click. It's faster than the average doctor's office visit – and with 24/7/365 convenience. Plus, no appointments required.

THE VIRTUAL SERVICES PROVIDE PATIENTS WITH:

- Treatment for low-acuity urgent conditions
- Your choice of trusted, U.S. board certified
- doctorsPrivate and secure video visits
- Consultation, diagnosis, and prescriptions when appropriate

HOW IT WORKS:

- Consumers can download the Covenant VirtualCare app at no cost, for a live, face-toface consultation with a board-certified physician. A free Covenant VirtualCare app is available for download on the Apple App Store or Google Play.
- Physicians have access to consumers' health insurance information and preferred pharmacy for immediate prescribing if needed.
- Consumers can see which doctors are available and choose an available doctor based on their profile information— which includes their photo, name, and area of specialization (such as women's health, children's health, etc.).
- Consumers can participate in a two-way video visit with a doctor.
- The cost? \$49 per visit, lower than many co-pays. Additionally, Covenant is working with insurance carriers to make Covenant VirtualCare visits a covered service.

Board-certified physicians can see you for urgent care illnesses like the following:

- Ear infection
- Sore throat
- Rash
- Respiratory infection
- Flu
- Urinary tract infection
- Headache
- Sinus infection
- Fever
- Pink eye

The Covenant Virtual Care app is perfect for parents of young children and people who have difficulty getting to the doctor's office due to work schedules, transportation or geographical location. The app is powered by American Well, a leading national telehealth technology and services company partnering with more than 180 healthcare organizations nationwide to bring care closer to patients.

COMING SOON: SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS

Covenant HealthCare Foundation takes great pride in offering students the opportunity to apply for scholarships to further their education. Over the past 10 years, the Foundation has granted over \$225,000 in scholarship money through the High School Scholarship program, Nursing scholarships, and the Zeile awards. A formal presentation of the scholarships are made at the Foundation's Spring Second Century Reception in May of each year. Students in the Saginaw, Bay, Tuscola, Arenac, Huron, Sanilac or Midland should watch out for the 2017 applications that will be released in January.

GIVING THROUGH COVENANT GIFT SHOPS

GIFT: something given voluntarily without payment, as to show favor toward someone, honor an occasion, or make a gesture of assistance; present; the act of giving; a special ability or capacity; natural endowment; talent.

Just thinking about the word "giving" in conjunction with Covenant HealthCare Gift Shops, several thoughts come to mind. The first is the vast amount of time and talent that the Covenant HealthCare Volunteers give in the daily operations of the shops. Their efforts are greatly appreciated. Just as important as the time and talent given in the shops, is the amount of caring and compassion the volunteers provide to each customer. Their friendly smile and warm words often help provide respite from the stresses of having a loved one in the hospital.

Another area of giving that may not be as widely known, is the 50/50 split in the profits from the operations of the gift shops. Fifty percent is given to the Foundation and fifty percent is given to the Covenant HealthCare Volunteers. With that said, 100% of the profits are given back to the hospital by the Foundation and Volunteers to help fund various projects and services that help Covenant serve the medical needs of our community.



How Our Volunteers Give

People choose to give because something was given to them. It could have been a financial gift, health after an illness, or goodwill from another individual. Regardless of the circumstance, giving takes place in a variety of ways.

Gifts of service speak to the heart of those it directly impacts. Giving a warm smile, friendly pat on the back or simply asking, "is there anything I can do to make your day more comfortable," impact our patients.

Within the walls of our organization, there are over 500 individuals that choose to be here and give of their time. They are our volunteers. Volunteers provide service in 50 different services throughout Covenant HealthCare and span across all of 5

main campuses, Irving, Frankenmuth, Bay City and some volunteer in their own homes creating baby hats, blankets and more for our patients.

In fiscal year 2016, there were 517 people who volunteered nearly 66,000 hours. Of these individuals, we had 80 high school students and 50 college students, many who volunteered directly at the bedside of our patients. Many college students seek volunteer opportunities at Covenant that parallel their field of study: pre-medicine, radiology, nursing, physical medicine, or pharmacy.

Volunteers not only provide deeds of service. They also do fundraising through special events like popcorn sales, Spring Fling and Tree of Love, and

portions of the revenue from baby photos and the Gift Shops. Volunteers use the revenue from these fundraisers to support High School Scholarships, the Cancer Care Center, the Family Comfort Fund, and other patient needs requested from departments like Women and Children's Services and Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation.

As you are making decisions where to give, please consider giving a few hours of your time to serving the needs of patients and their families.
