
There are three layers of emergency preparedness and response – county (local), regional and state. Covenant participates in the Saginaw County Emergency Preparedness Council, Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) and Region 3 HealthCare Coalition. We work with the state as necessary, which is all tied in together on the health care preparedness side and the state police side.

Before 9/11, all emergency management was through the state police. After 9/11, the government created a system just for health care emergency preparedness and public health departments. U.S. Department of Health & Human Services(HHS) Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response (ASPR), the Technical Resources, Assistance Center, and Information Exchange (TRACIE), also known as ASPR TRACIE.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE

CONTINUED...

- **The Saginaw County Emergency Preparedness Council (SCEPC)** is comprised of hospitals, county emergency management, Red Cross, law enforcement, fire service, pre-hospital care, MBS airport, several nursing homes, schools, the public health department, county government and several other organizations. We plan and facilitate county wide disaster drills and work together on county-wide planning.
- **The Saginaw County Mobile Emergency Medical System (MEMS)** Subcommittee (part of the SCEPC) plans for the MEMS, which is a federal government invention to deal with a surge of victims. We have secured two schools to serve as an alternate care center in the event of a disaster and have completed an exercise at one.
- **Region 3 HealthCare Coalition (R3HCC)** is funded by grants from the federal government, as a result of 9/11. The region has no legal authority, only mandates as a result of the grants. The R3HCC office is located in the Houghton building. In an emergency, R3HCC would be essential in helping local authorities find assets. The R3HCC has stockpiled equipment and supplies and would release as necessary. They can also tap into the state and federal resources if necessary.



**Note: During the Coronavirus Pandemic both The Region and Saginaw County Emergency Management helped Covenant obtain PPE for staff protection. The Region provided multiple shipments of PPE from their stockpile to the organization.*

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE

WHAT SHOULD I DO IF A DISASTER HAPPENS?

As a Covenant employee, if you are at work, you would be notified of a disaster by a PA announcement, network message, Vocera Alert or Broadcast badge message and/or pager. If you are at home, you would be notified by phone from your department, or by radio and TV announcements. Uniforms aren't necessary in a disaster or emergency, but shoes, clothing and your name tag are.

In the event of an internal disaster or emergency at Covenant, don't use the elevators unless they are deemed safe by engineering or the fire department. You should also secure cash, records and medications. Pay attention to PA announcements, network messages and your email.

**Note: Every time incident command meets our Public Information Officer or Internal Communication Specialist will send an email update to all employees.*

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE

WHAT SHOULD I DO IF A DISASTER HAPPENS?

If You Hear Code Yellow, Level 1: Alert

- Be prepared to postpone routine activities. Be aware of your workload.
- Be aware of changing conditions.
- Check the computer network for messages.
- You may want to check your email if able.
- Review your departments response plan in the safety manual.

If You Hear Code Yellow, Level 2: Implement Incident Command/Response Plan

- Life and safety are the number one priorities.
- Routine services and business may need to be discontinued as directed by management and Incident Command.
- Check the computer network and your email (if possible) for messages. Listen for PA and Vocera announcements.

EMERGENCY OPERATIONS PLAN

EOP

During an emergency situation involving an incident that happened off campus or an incident that impacts one of our buildings, we have an emergency operations plan (EOP) that guides us to the proper procedure for the incident. Our emergency operations plans is based on an “all hazards” approach dealing with the situations - communications, resources/assets, safety, security, staffing, utilities, and clinical activities. All employees must know how to access the EOP and what their roles will be in an event.

Here are some examples of why we might need to activate our EOP:

Influx of patients (e.g.. Pileup of cars on I-75, mass shooting event, chemical release, etc.)

- Gas leak
- Fire
- Hazardous materials situation
- Pandemic

EMERGENCY OPERATIONS PLAN

DISASTER PARADIGM

Detection

- Has an issue been detected? What caused this to happen?

Incident management

- Does the organization need Incident Command activated?

Safety & security

- Is this a Safety or Security issue? If so, is Safety or Security present?

Assess hazards

- Did anyone assess the hazards that could be present?

Support

- What support, people and supplies are needed?

Triage & treatment

- Is triage for patients needed? What type and how much treatment do the patients need?

Evacuation

- Can staff evacuate if needed? Can the organization evacuate and transport patients?

Recovery

- What recovery issues are present with this situation?
- Does the organizations needs exceed current resources?



RECOGNIZE, AVOID, ISOLATE, NOTIFY

RAIN

Emergency situations can happen at any time, and it is important to be aware of your surroundings, know your role (what to do), and who to tell for different emergencies and situations in your area.

- R** Recognize the presence of a hazard
- A** Avoid contamination through use of protection
- I** Isolate hazards by securing the area
- N** Notify appropriate upper management (*example: Security/5.2222/Manager*)

RECOGNIZE, AVOID, ISOLATE, NOTIFY

RECOGNIZE: DOES IT BELONG?

Unusual Activity

Behavior

Hazardous weather conditions

Suspicious Packages

Things out of place

Strange smells

Abnormal fogs or mists

Unexplained liquids

You need to be able to **Recognize** the hazard: What do I see, hear, or smell?

This may include the presence of unusual activities or behaviors.

Examples of unusual activities / behavior:

- Persons wearing inappropriate clothing for current weather conditions
- Hospital visitors exploring restricted areas
- Persons taking pictures of facilities
- Persons frequently visiting for inconsistent or unsubstantiated reasons
- Large vehicles parked in visitor areas (i.e., large trucks in non-loading dock areas)
- Unattended packages

Hazardous weather conditions: Tornadoes may happen with little or no warning.

RECOGNIZE, **AVOID**, ISOLATE, NOTIFY

AVOID: WHAT DO I STAY AWAY FROM?

Remember that life safety for yourself, other staff member and patients is important. Think about the situation before acting to avoid becoming a victim. Take actions to avoid liquids, powders, clouds, or vapors and out of sight of any potential improvised explosive device. If you can see a bomb, the bomb can see you and kill you! Apply the concepts of time, distance, and shielding. Avoiding exposure time to the threat, put distance between yourself and the threat, and protective equipment or barriers between yourself and the threat.

If you are a victim, you cannot help others!

RECOGNIZE, AVOID, ISOLATE, NOTIFY

ISOLATE: “WHO DO I KEEP AWAY”?

Fire doors may be used to help contain a fire as well as support containment of a security threat or infectious area. It is each department’s responsibility to know how to control and / or contain their area. Access to critical areas must be controlled.

It is important to note security needs. It is everyone’s responsibility to assist with preventing unauthorized access. Do not open locked doors to persons outside. Watch for and report persons entering an isolated area, and make sure the appropriate signs are posted.

Take action to isolate or reduce exposure to contamination or threats; attempt to remove oneself from the contaminated zone, remove other people who may be in the contaminated zone, and keep people from going into the contaminated zone. Evacuation may be necessary.

RECOGNIZE, AVOID, ISOLATE, NOTIFY

NOTIFY: “WHAT NUMBER DO I CALL & WHO DO I CALL”?


Any employee who encounters an emergency situation in which the health or safety of patients, staff, and/or visitors shall alert the proper departments of the internal emergency situation by contacting **5.2222 (external 911)** and the Supervisor immediately of the type of event. (examples, fire, active shooter, bomb threat, etc.)
*(The emergency line call also be contacted via **cellphone** by dialing **583.2222**)*

It is important to know what belongs in your area and what doesn't so that things like suspicious packages and chemical spills are **recognized** right away. **Avoid** touching or tasting unknown liquids, objects, packages, etc. **Isolate** and contain the area. Evacuation and / or decontamination may be necessary. Also remember to consider security concerns. Call for help and **notify** appropriate persons.
